Throughout his life, Ryan gave where he saw the need, and rallied others to do the same.

By the age of 9, he raised money for the Pediatric Specialty Clinic at Yale by selling self-made books and putting on one-man Disney-movie plays in his garage. A back- yard fair raised over \$1600 for the Wallingford Homeless Shelter.

In 8th grade, Ryan received his school's Community

**Service Award** for his efforts in raising funds for Cystic Fibrosis, efforts which he continued through the end of his high school years. And posthumously, Cystic Fibrosis gave him their Hero Award for his fundraising and volunteer efforts.

At the tender age of 19, Ryan lost his life to a very aggressive cancer.

A week before his death, and in keeping with his life-long spirit of giving, Ryan asked that \$70,000 of his unused college funds be donated to charities that were important to him, and he hoped his donations would inspire others to do the same after he was gone.

Ryan's legacy is now a fund at The Community Foundation of Middlesex County (CFMC is a 501(c)(3) organization) called Ryan's Circle of Giving (RCG). Since 2006, an additional \$200,000 has been raised through various fundraising efforts, and equally distributed to the charities that meant so much to Ryan.

Ryan was passionate about family, friends, golf and giving. By combining all four elements into the RCG Golf Classic, we believe we are truly honoring his spirit.

#### **ABOUT PAUL DRURY**



Paul was born in 1966 with Cystic Fibrosis (CF) and he is one of the reasons Ryan chose CF as a charity to which he wanted to donate \$25,000 of his college fund.

Paul lived a full life with CF as a kid, surrounded by the love and care of his parents and 5 older siblings, playing basketball, golf

and hockey. His health changed dramatically as a freshman at UCONN in the late 80's, and despite having to take a leave from school, he completed a degree in economics.

Shortly thereafter, Paul's lungs deteriorated to the point where he was on oxygen for a full year and, in 1995, at Layola University Hospital, he became the first double-lung transplant recipient to move from oxygen to surgery. His recovery was remarkable.

Following that recovery, Paul began volunteering for The Connecticut Chapter of The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, creating a marathon golf event that is still raising money for life-saving research. Paul eventually went to work at CF, becoming the Executive Director of the Connecticut Chapter and more recently, prior to his death, its Director of Special Projects.

Paul has helped to raise millions of dollars for CF through his many signature events, including the 65 Roses Golf Tournament and its Sportscaster's Ball where Ryan volunteered throughout high school.

With new lungs that were supposed to last for 5-10 years, Paul went on to live an incredibly productive and wonderful life for 20 years, finally succumbing, at age 50, to his failing lungs on December 19, 2016.

When Ryan was 15, it was Paul who let us know that he was being honored with the Connecticut Chapter's CF Volunteer of the Year award; and again, after Ryan died, Paul contacted us to tell us that the Connecticut Chapter was posthumously honoring him with their Hero award at the 2006 Sportscasters Ball at Mohegan Sun. Paul will always hold a special place in our hearts, and we will always feel a debt of gratitude to him for all that he did for Ryan – and for us.

Paul was cherished for his kindness, his great sense of humor, his passion for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, and for his inspiring courage. He was a talented Pointillism artist. Paul was known for his love of family, friends, his dogs and his loving wife, Ivona.

It is with great sadness and honor that we will be remembering Paul at this year's tournament.

#### **ABOUT JACK HUBER**



Our friend, Jack Huber, died on February, 20th, 2017, after a courageous battle with mesothelioma. Though Jack was a dog-lover, it could be said he had the 9 lives of a cat, as he survived so many life-threatening health issues throughout his 66 years.

Since 2000, Jack was a loyal

participant in each of our golf tournaments; first, at the Kiddush Cup and then, at our first RCG Golf Classic in 2015. Though he had not yet been diagnosed, he was too sick to attend last year's event

Born in 1950, Jack was raised and lived in Wallingford his entire life. After receiving a B.S. from UCONN (where he met the love of his life, Nancy), he attained a master's degree in public administration from the University of New Haven with a concentration in health administration. During his tenure with the State of Connecticut, he rose to the position of Assistant Director of Operations at the Commission of Hospitals and Healthcare/Office of Healthcare Access.

What drove Jack more than anything, though, was his love of family and his passion for sports.

Jack spent many years coaching Little League, girls softball, Baseball Travel and All-Star teams, as well as basketball and soccer, all in Wallingford, and all of which included one or more of his four children – Sarah, Seth, Evan and Jen. Jack's coaching days, though, really began as a kid, when he spent hours teaching his younger siblings, Keith and Cathy, the finer points of the games he loved. Jack understood the importance of pursuing one's passion...and spent his lifetime passing his passions on to others, giving them the opportunity to grow into their full potential. But his love of helping others didn't stop at the playing field.

When Ryan was 11 years old, Jack knew of his love of hockey and his desire to be a play-by-play announcer. In a tower high above the baseball fields in Wallingford, Jack made a young boy's dream come true, and cemented Ryan's own passion for broadcasting. Jack's connections with the Little League's game announcer got Ryan a one-time gig to do the same, and Ryan took full advantage of the opportunity. One can only imagine what that did for a little boy with big dreams.

Throughout his lifetime, Jack was a political and social advocate for those who weren't as fortunate as he, and he forged relationships and lasting friendships in all spheres of his and Nancy's life. He was beloved by all who knew him, and his death leaves a huge hole in the lives of all who were touched by him.
